Cambodian schools were closed for almost two years throughout Covid. During that time, many students fell behind their levels, many have delayed their start and some have lost much of their language skills. Now is the most important time to help them to develop their thinking skills, their language fluency and their selfesteem. We want them to go forward with tools to help them get ahead even after the setbacks they have faced. We can proudly say that since the schools re-opened, we have returned to many of our trusted partners and have begun working with new ones. Organizations recognize the need for these soft skills and are turning to us for instruction.

We have added <u>Kulen Outreach</u>, <u>Heartprint</u>, <u>Ponheary</u> <u>Ly Foundation</u> programs at Chey Primary School and <u>Chumkriel Language School</u> as new partners. All this since the beginning of March! We are also happy to say that we have once again worked with the original partner, Anjali House and the partners that initially encouraged the founding of Writing Through, Enfants du Mekong.

We know that our program works. We have seen the results and spoken to teachers who share with us the impact that they see in the students long after the workshop has ended. As we get bigger as an organization, demonstrating our impact is becoming more important. How do you measure creativity? Thanks to our incredible volunteer Selin Ahipasaoglu, a math professor at the University of Southampton, we are working on quantifying our outcomes. We have been working on a randomized control trial to compare the creativity of students who have done our workshops to those that have not. This is incredibly exciting and is being fully funded by the university. We can't wait to share the results with you!


